Dear Chief Clerk Anderson and Chief Clerk Blazel:

Thank you for the opportunity to submit the Wisconsin Child Abuse and Neglect Prevention Board *Program Evaluation Report* pursuant to Wis. Stats. §48.982 (7)(h).

The Prevention Board awarded over \$13 million to support local and statewide child abuse and neglect primary prevention efforts during SFY24 and SFY25. The continued receipt of federal ARPA funds allowed the Prevention Board to support statewide and local child maltreatment prevention efforts at a significant level. In total, the Prevention Board funded 96 community-based programs representing 66 counties, five tribes, and 21 school districts throughout Wisconsin during SFY24 and SFY25. Due to federal funding cuts, the Prevention Board will not be able to provide this level of support to local communities going forward.

Wis. Stats. §48.982 (7)(h) requires the Wisconsin Child Abuse and Neglect Prevention Board (Prevention Board) to conduct an evaluation of the effectiveness of the programs it funds under Wis. Stats. §48.982 (4) and (6) in achieving their stated goals and submit a report to the legislature by June 30 of each odd-numbered year. To comply with the statutory mandate, the Prevention Board submits this report.¹

The Prevention Board funds child maltreatment primary prevention initiatives that provide support for all families, regardless of risk. The goal of the funding is to prevent initial occurrences of child maltreatment. During SFY24 and SFY25 the Prevention Board awarded over \$13 million in grants to local community-based organizations, counties, statewide advocacy organizations, and university researchers.

As of the date of this report, the Family Resource Navigators program (see p. 8) was terminated two months before the end of the contract period due to the U.S. Department of Education terminating the extension of ARPA education stabilization funds. This program was a partnership between local Family Resource Centers and local school districts (primarily in rural communities) to provide services for school children experiencing homelessness and their families. The funds were used to employ a person within each participating Family Resource Center to help connect referred school children and their families to housing and other services to support obtaining housing. The federal Department of Education terminated the funding with no advance notice on March 28, 2025. The Prevention Board used other funds, including funds from a private foundation, to keep the navigators at each Family Resource Center employed through the end of April 2025. The decision to divert funds from other programming means the Prevention Board will not be able to fund as many programs in SFY26.

The Prevention Board funded grants in the following program areas during SFY24 and SFY25:

Evidence-informed Parent Education Grants

Grants were awarded across four categories: Evidence-informed Parent Education Child Abuse and Neglect Prevention, Triple P Expansion, Training and Technical Assistance for the Parent Education grantees, and the Wisconsin Prevention Reporting System.

The University of Kansas developed a reporting system for the Department of Children and Families’ home-visiting program grantees. They added a module for parent education grantees to make reporting easier for grantees and more efficient.

Family Resource Center (FRC) Network Infrastructure Development

Grants were awarded across five categories: FRC Infrastructure Development, FRC of Quality, FRC Pathways, FRC Network Training and Technical Assistance for the grantees, and 2-1-1 guided search for the grantees.

Program Evaluation and Research

Grants were awarded across six evaluation and research areas to (1) provide training and technical assistance at four adult correctional institutions and two county jails, (2) evaluate the Family Resource Center Infrastructure Development initiative, (3) survey families, and (4) an epidemiologist to analyze child maltreatment data.

1) University of Wisconsin – Madison Sandra Rosenbaum School of Social Work – Grants were awarded to provide training and technical assistance to implement a parent education program for parents incarcerated in four Department of Corrections institutions; to evaluate the Making Reading Memories program in two county jails, where incarcerated parents record themselves reading a book that is then sent to the custodial parent so the child can read along with the incarcerated parent; and to evaluate a parent education program in county jails.

Celebrate Children Foundation

The Celebrate Children Foundation (Foundation) was incorporated in 1999 as the 501(c)(3) arm of the Prevention Board. The Foundation works in partnership with the Prevention Board to provide communities throughout the state with evidence-based prevention programs and services while engaging in research to develop innovative approaches to prevent child maltreatment and strengthen families. Grants were awarded in SFY24 and SFY25 to 12 community-based agencies to purchase books for families and provide concrete supports if needed. Grants were awarded to:
